

"Architecture has to do with the art of living and of building the best habitat for that life," said Diego Villaseñor. His passion for the balance between light and shadow and his love for nature, inspired the designs within the complex, from the fishbone pergolas, the wooden shutters, the palapa roofs and even the use of wooden bridges as main access to each Villa. "Diego has used his unique abilities to create the Montecito concept, a retreat where the power of the sea, the land and the air are channeled by the mastery of a true artist," said Greg Glassman, director of Montecito.

Throughout the complex you can see different art works by the Mexican sculptor Adán Paredes, who describes Montecito as a dream come true and "the most beautiful pearl of the Mexican Pacific".

To date there are 15 completed and occupied Villas, and seven more that have recently been added to their inventory. The Villas are available for sale or for rent and designed for intermittent and permanent travelers. Between the tropical jungle, the unique views, the coastal architecture and the countless amenities, the reasons to love Montecito are truly endless.
